HOW DO I SCHEDULE MY CHILD FOR SUMMER SCHOOL?

- Complete the card with the student's information, front and back, sign both sides of the card.
- An "In case of emergency person" should be listed on the front of the card.
- Some classes have a set time, some do not. We base the scheduling on what the parents choose and that creates the need for the classes. It's best to write down the classes you want most as choice one, then choice two and so on. **Alternatives must be written down or they will be chosen for the student. Choose the classes for the grade level they are in now, they do not advance in the summer school program.**
- Swimming and Tennis registration are NOT at the Elementary offices, you must register at LHS. Do not write these courses on the Elementary Summer School registration card.**
- If the student is taking one or two sessions you should choose 3 different courses for each session. Unless otherwise noted in the book, all of the choices should be different including the alternative.

- Please come to one of the registration nights. If you cannot make it to the night registrations, please give the completed registration card to your school's secretary, they will send it to Woodside School by March 3, 2016.
- If you do not turn your child's card in by March 3, you can call Woodside School and be placed on a waiting list. Late registration will require appointments by calling 715-424-6793 to schedule a time with Ms. Anderson.
- Busing: If you need busing, students must be registered for both choices from 8:30 - 11:55 a.m. You can register a student for one class, but parents will need to provide transportation.
- If you need a particular bus route please write that information on the back of the card.

2016 SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM REGISTRATION INFORMATION

It's time to register for the 2016 Summer School Program. As you review the course booklet, you will notice that we have added some classes as well as enhanced some courses to better provide for more "active" learning experiences. These changes and additions will offer some very exciting activities for our students.

Unless otherwise noted in the summer school book, classes are approximately 8:30 am to Noon.
(Washington releases buses at 11:45 am) (Woodside releases buses at 11:55 am)

Primary Classes ("P") KG - 2nd Grades at Woodside Elementary School

Intermediate Classes ("I") 3rd - 5th Grades at Washington Elementary School

Session 1: Monday, June 13 – Thursday, June 30

Session II: Tuesday, July 5 – Thursday, July 21 (No classes – July 1 or July 4)

Parents are requested to register their children for three classes they would like to participate in for each session, please read the instructions in the front of the book. Every attempt will be made to ensure that students will receive two of their three courses. The district reserves the right to cancel any classes that do not have an adequate number of students registered for the course, or for which a certified teacher can not be hired.

Students at Rudolph and Vesper Elementary Schools may register through their school offices, simply complete the registration card and give it to the school office, or they may register their children at any of the following schools listed below. Students at Mead, Woodside, Grant/Grove and Howe & Washington may register at any of the schools listed below. You may enroll your child at any of the schools on the date and time that is most convenient.

Mead – Thursday, February 25 (3:45-5:45 pm)

Woodside – Friday, February 26 (3:45-6:15 pm)

Grant/Grove – Tuesday, March 1 (3:45-5:45 pm)

Howe and Washington – Thursday, March 3 (3:45-5:45 pm)

There will be no special registration for non-public school students. Please Note: It is very important that you attempt to register your child during the above dates and times. **We will not be able to guarantee classes and sessions if you register after March 3, 2016.**

After the registration period ends, exact times for each of the courses will be set. **Students will receive their summer school schedules before the end of school, June 2, 2016.** Busing information will be mailed home.

Parents who are unable to register in person, may send the completed registration card with their child to their school office prior to March 3.

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GENERAL INFORMATION

MISSION STATEMENT

It is the policy of the Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools to provide appropriate instruction during the summer at both the elementary and secondary level. Summer School should be an integral part of the total school program offering a balance of courses which may be academic, enriching, remedial and applicable to the special needs of the pupils residing in the Wisconsin Rapids attendance area. Registration shall be open to all pupils. However, entrance requirements (such as grade levels) may be imposed for some classes and attendance in others may be required for some pupils. The Summer School Program will be reviewed annually and classes added or dropped depending on the needs of the pupils residing in the District.

REGISTRATION

All students who enroll in the WRPS Summer School Program must have either attended the public or parochial schools as a registered 5K - 5th grade, **(No 4K)** student during the 2015-2016 school year within our district boundaries, or currently reside within the district boundaries and/or participate in a home schooling arrangement. **Students who register for the 2016 Summer School Program must register for courses according to the grade level they attended during the 2015-2016 school year.**

(Please refer to the registration schedule printed on the first page for dates, times, and sites for registration.)

FEES

There is no fee, or charge, for any WRPS Summer School class. However, it is very important that if you register your child for classes, they attend. Staff is hired, and supplies purchased, to meet the number of students who are registered. **If your child fails to attend, the district will not receive financial support from the state for your child, while being forced to expend funds, unnecessarily on staff and supplies for a child that does not attend.**

WHERE WILL CLASSES BE HELD?

Elementary Summer School classes will be held at Woodside Elementary School (5K - 2nd) and Washington Elementary (3 - 5), **unless otherwise noted in the course description.** Summer office hours will be from 8:00 - 12:15. There will be no supervision of students before 8:15 a.m. Due to busing arrangements, students at Washington Elementary will be dismissed at approximately 11:45 a.m.

WHEN ARE THE SESSIONS SCHEDULED?

Session I Monday, June 13 - Thursday, June 30 (No school July 1 or 4) **Session II** Monday, July 5 - Thursday, July 21

CLASS TIMES

Courses at Woodside Elementary (5K - 2nd grades) will run from 8:30 - 10:00 a.m. and from 10:00 - 11:55 a.m. Elementary courses at Washington Elementary (3rd - 5th) will run from 8:30 - 10:00 a.m. and from 10:00 - 11:45 a.m., unless noted otherwise.

ATTENDANCE

Except for emergencies, students are expected to attend all summer school classes. This program is funded through a formula that is based upon student attendance. Whenever a student does not attend the classes they are scheduled for, the funding is reduced. Therefore, we ask for your cooperation in seeing that your child attends each day. We ask that parents contact the school office any time their child will not be attending the class. In the event of emergencies, parents should contact the office of the school in which the student's summer school classes are scheduled. Students who fail to meet attendance expectations will be dropped from the course.

DRESS AND CONDUCT

Students are expected to follow the same standards of dress and conduct as those which are in effect during the school year.

Bus transportation will be provided for elementary students who reside outside the school sites selected for summer school. Bus transportation will also be provided for these students if they ride the bus during the regular school year. Please check "yes" on the registration card (back cover) if bus transportation is desired. If transportation is required from a licensed child care center or a babysitter, please note such information on the registration card. **If your child's "drop-off" address will change frequently (more than two locations or on "alternating weeks") you are asked to complete a transportation schedule sheet at the time of registration.** This schedule sheet will assist us in making sure that your child gets to the correct location after school. Also, if your current address changes at any time after registration, please contact us.

If you are altering your student's regular bus schedule due to an appointment, or other reason, the school office (that your child is attending) must be contacted prior to 10:00 a.m. on the morning of the change. This will permit us to inform your child, your child's teacher, and the bus company.

NON-RESIDENT STUDENTS

Students who do not reside in the Wisconsin Rapids School District are welcome to attend Summer School. The tuition will be \$50 for one (1) class for a three (3) week session, or \$100 for two (2) classes for a three (3) week session. **Transportation will not be provided to students who are not residents of the Wisconsin Rapids Public School District.**

CANCELLATION

Summer School courses will not be held if enrollments are insufficient for the operation of a given program or if qualified staff can not be hired. If your student's class is dropped, your child will be enrolled in the course they have selected as their third choice.

PRIMARY ENRICHMENT COURSES (Grades 1-2 & K where Indicated)

ART

P-1 VISUAL ARTS (K-2) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

A course for students interested in art. The course will encompass a sequence of activities involving creating, drawing, sketching, and painting to create and design original masterpieces. Students will use a variety of media.

P-4 THE READING ARTIST (K-2) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

Each day children will be captivated by beautifully illustrated and written literature. An array of interesting art projects will be created to enhance the enjoyment of the books. This class is designed to encourage a love of reading in our youngest readers.

COMPUTER STUDIES

P-5 FUN WITH TUXPAINT: Drawing with TuxPaint! (K-2) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

Students will learn to draw a fun picture and write simple sentences describing it each day. Students will print their pictures and make a book. They will learn how to use capital letters and punctuation besides improving their drawing skills.

MUSIC

P-9 SING, DANCE & PLAY SESSION I ONLY: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

Students will explore a variety of musical concepts, including: folk dance, music "play" songs, lots of singing and playing instrumental accompaniments to songs.

MATHEMATICS

P-11 IT PUZZLES ME (1-2) Both Sessions: 10:00-11:55

Have Fun! We will use a wide assortment of puzzles: Word, Math, Hidden Pictures, Treasure Hunts with clues, 3-D jigsaw puzzles and many more. Learn teamwork, creative thinking, following steps and procedures all while having fun working with puzzles.

P-12 ACTION MATH! Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

This course is intended to expose students to a wide variety of number situations. Activities will include the use of **games, manipulatives, investigations**, and direct **instruction of basic math concepts** (number order, number patterns, addition, subtraction, and more). Students learn best by doing and this class will provide the activities that will help them to become an **active math user!**

READING & CREATIVE EDUCATION

P-4 THE READING ARTIST (K-2) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

Each day children will be captivated by beautifully illustrated and written literature. An array of interesting art projects will be created to enhance the enjoyment of the books.

P-16 FIRST GRADE READING INTERVENTION (1) Both Sessions: ALL MORNING CLASS 8:30-11:55

Participation in this class is limited and is by teacher invitation only, please bring the invitation to registration.

This class will offer small group reading intervention for first graders. It will include reviewing reading strategies, shared book reading, self-selected reading, writing, and "making words." **Students taking this class will enroll in one class for the three-week period. Students will be enrolled in the class from 8:30 - 11:55.**

P-17 TASTY TRAVELS (2) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

Discover the wonders of the countries of the world. You'll use your passport to enter each country, read about their cultures, learn interesting facts, play games, make artwork and crafts, and cook foods from each country. You'll discover the history of their flags and each country's place in the world. You'll even make a recipe book to take home, so you'll be able to cook for your family. If you like an adventure, this delicious voyage is for you!

P-18 THE "COOL COOK" (K-1) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

This class is offered to our younger students who are interested in learning to create some delicious snacks, while learning to follow recipes. The snacks will require "cool" cooking techniques which are appropriate for our younger students.

P-24 FIRST "FUNTASTICS" (K) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55 (MUST ATTEND BOTH SESSIONS)

This six-week long class is intended **only for Kindergarten students entering first grade in 2016-2017**. Students who participate in this class will experience a wide variety of activities at their level, including: reading, writing, creating books, science, and social studies. Students who participate in this program will remain in this class for the full six-weeks of the summer school program. Students may participate in one other class during both the first and second sessions of summer school.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

P-37 GAME PLAY (K-2) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

Students will have the opportunity to play a variety of indoor and outdoor games. The students will improve their fitness level, gross motor skills, problem solving, mathematics, and language arts. The games will focus on teamwork, cooperation, sportsmanship and FUN!

PRIMARY ENRICHMENT COURSES *(Grades 1-2 & K where Indicated)*

SCIENCE

P-28 DOWN IN THE DEEP (K-2) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

Learn about ocean life: whales, dolphins, starfish, sharks and many more. We will read and make books, learn songs, paint, and do different art projects to make our classroom look like the ocean.

P-29 DINOSAUR PARK (K-2) Both Sessions: 10:00-11:55

This is a study of the land of giants and monsters during an era before we even measured time. Join this group and become acquainted with the Stegosaurus, the Brontosaurus, the Tyrannosaurus, and many more.

P-30 PICTURE IT! - SCIENCE LESSONS Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

Think like a reader, explore like a scientist! In this class, we will use children's picture books as a spark for practicing reading strategies and exploring topics in science.



P-31 THOSE AMAZING ANIMALS! (K-2) Both Sessions: 10:00-11:55

Animals come in all shapes and sizes from the largest whale to the smallest insect. Each one has an amazing story about how they live and interact with people. Students in this course will investigate the unique and exciting lives of animals from all parts of the world. Students will read, write, draw, and share all they learn about our animal friends.

P-32 WEIRD SCIENCE (K-2) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:55

This course will focus on a wide variety of hands-on activities. Students will be actively involved in problem solving and discovering the science process.

P-34 OUTER SPACE ADVENTURES (K-2) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00

Would you like to travel to another planet? Come and explore space as we travel to all planets in the solar system, invent new constellations, and tell stories of our travels. We will be writing stories, making craft projects, reading books, and doing finger plays as we explore the unknown.

ART

I-1 THE "CRAFTY" ARTIST Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00

Interested in a course offering artistic adventures? This course will encompass activities involving drawing, sketching, painting, and creating. Students will also learn to enjoy the "art" of crafting. Make exciting items for your bedroom and home using some unusual art materials.

I-2 INTRO TO COMPUTER ANIMATION / CARTOONING Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:45

Get your creative juices flowing with this fun-filled class designed for 3rd-5th grade artist and technology enthusiasts alike. Create your own doodle, flip-book, and two-layered animations using basic computer animation techniques. Developed in cooperation with the Betty Boop Festival Wisconsin, this class will give budding animators the opportunity to showcase their talents.

I-24 SEW WHAT'S NEW! (5-7 Grade Students) SESSION I ONLY: 8:30-11:30 at Lincoln High School

Learn something new this summer! All 5th and 7th grade boys and girls are invited to have fun exploring their creative skills by sewing several projects. Learn to operate a sewing machine, sew a decorative pillow, pull-on shorts, and locker caddy and then make your very own sling bag. Other projects will be available for an additional cost. Don't miss the fun! This class will be held **Monday-Friday at Lincoln High School from June 13 - June 30**. Required materials include 2 spools of thread; one white and one black. **(Maximum Class Size: 15)**

I-43 QUILTING (5-7 ONLY) Session II ONLY: 8:30-11:30 at Lincoln High School

Straight sewing lines and LOTS of color fabric will create a fun and functional quilt for your room or as a perfect "homemade" gift from the heart. Learn the basics of machine sewing, hand stitching, and quilt tying techniques as you develop the skills to make your very own work of art! You will complete a twin quilt in this three week course. This class will be held at LHS. The class will last from 8:30 - 11:30 a.m. Students will be transported from the elementary school site to LHS and back again at the end of the day to catch the bus home. (Held Monday - Friday, July 5 - July 21) **(Maximum Class Size: 15) Cannot Repeat Course**

I-44 GREAT AMERICAN SCULPT-A-THON Both Sessions: 10:00-11:45

Students will be learning about the three dimensional art of sculpting. While in class students will be exploring different media including but not limited to paper maché, ceramics, wire and junk. If weather permits we will create sculptures outdoors using objects found in nature. WRPS offers the Google Document family to all of our students K-12 on each of our district computers and expect our students to become proficient in each of the Google Documents being used in this summer school program. **Learning how to use these tools will help your child to be a more efficient and successful learner.**

I-9 STOP ACTION ADVENTURES

Are you creative? Do you like to take pictures and create animations from them? In this class you will create short videos from pictures taken by you!



I-41 ROBOTICS Both Sessions: 10:00-11:45

Students will utilize teamwork, creative thinking, and problem solving to design and program wireless LEGO machines using the latest in LEGO technology - NXT Mindstorms 2.0. They will also have an opportunity to extend their understanding of robotics by building and operating a hydraulic robot arm: T-Bot.

FOREIGN CULTURE

I-7 BEGINNING SPANISH (Grades 4-5 Only) SESSION I ONLY: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:45

“Bienvenidos actores y actrices” (Welcome actors and actresses!) As we prepare a modern version of the play “*Goldilock y los Tres Osos*,” we will learn new vocabulary to describe rooms and items in the house. Discover differences and similarities between house in Spanish speaking countries and the United States. Work in small groups to create and decorate scenery. Modify the lines of the play to use Spanish to describe the unique hours your group creates while you re-tell the story of Goldilocks. Create invitations and make “limondata” for the audience who will attend our live performance on the last day of class. **(Maximum Class Size: 15)**

MATHEMATICS

I-12 EVERYDAY MATH Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:45

Students will learn math using a variety of “hands on” activities and computer technology to maintain, catch-up, or enhance their skill level in Mathematics. Students will experience the “real life” math skills involved in their daily lives. Going to the store, going out with friends, ordering “fast food”, or purchasing “sale” items are all part of this course.

I-13 SLOWING THE SUMMER SLIDE Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:45

Has your 4th or 5th Grader struggled with knowing their multiplication and division facts well? Students can lose or “slide” in mathematical computation skills after the summer months. This class will offer practice and reinforcement of multiplication and division basic math facts through a variety of hands-on learning activities to slow the summer slide.

NEW!

I-15 PERPLEXORS SESSION I ONLY: 8:30-10:00

Study entertaining problems that require deductive reasoning, logical elimination and math skills. Using clues, cross off words in a list of all possible answers to arrive at a solution. Parents: This class will help to get them ready for the new state assessments.

READING & CREATIVE EDUCATION

I-21 READERS THEATRE Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00

This class is intended to assist students in the development of “fluency” as they read. Students will assume the role of specific characters as they read selected plays. As the plays are read and shared with their classmates, students will be practicing their ability to read fluently while enjoying some great plays and some humorous moments together. This class is not intended to be a “performance” class. No plays will be put on for other classes or parents.

SOCIAL STUDIES

I-3 CREATIVE BAKING Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:45

Sweet treats-who doesn't love them? In this class you will learn the basics of baking (measuring ingredients, rolling dough, types of sugars), and create some great sweet treats in the process. Dessert pizza, creative cupcakes, no-bake cookies, and brownie treats will be just some of the things that we will be creating. No cooking experience is necessary.

NEW!

I-27 AROUND THE WORLD IN FIFTEEN DAYS SESSION II ONLY: 8:30-10:00

Pack your bags! Get your passports ready. Travel from Africa to Australia, the North Pole to Antarctica, from Europe to South America. Taste the native foods, learn their games, practice a bit of the language, listen to the folk tales and music from countries all over the world. Experience the culture and learn about the wildlife as we travel to a different country every day.

INTERMEDIATE ENRICHMENT COURSES (Grades 3-5)

SCIENCE

I-23 FLIGHT! UP-TIGHT POWERED AIRPLANES Both Sessions: 10:00-11:45

Higher, faster, farther...rubber-band powered gliders will get you both up-tight and excited. We may have flown to other planets and are now stretching the boundaries of our universe, but we still have a long way to go before we have mastered the science of "Flight". **Students will build rubber-band powered gliders and compete against each other's designs. We will take a look at flying machines of the past and design some for our future! This is a "hands-on" course that will make your dreams soar!**

I-6 POWER OF THE SUN: FUN WITH SOLAR ENERGY SESSION II ONLY: 10:00-11:45

This class will teach the students the science behind "green engineering" through lessons that reinforce the science concepts of solar energy and energy transfer. As students engage in Engineering Design Process to design insulation for a solar oven they will brainstorm, design, create, test and improve their own solar oven.

I-8 THERE SHE BLOWS! PUTTING WIND POWER TO WORK SESSION I ONLY: 10:00-11:45

This class will teach students the science behind engineering various types of technologies. Children are bombarded with hundreds of types of technology. If asked, children would quickly name off all of the electronic technologies they use in a day. However, this course will demonstrate to them that not all technology is "electronic". In this class, students will investigate the many other types of technologies and learn the engineering that goes on in their development. They will specifically investigate wind energy, and will brainstorm, design, create, test and improve their own windmill.

I-28 CSI RAPIDS Both Sessions: 10:00-11:45

Ever wonder how forensic scientists help to solve mysteries? Think you might make an excellent detective? Do you often solve the crime before the television detective does? If you answered "yes" to any of these questions, you will love this class! You will discover techniques used by scientists while they work to solve real life mysteries!

I-30 ROCKETRY SESSION 1 ONLY: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:45

Students will begin the class by designing and building their own miniature *straw rockets* and learn about what makes rockets fly!! Just like early rocket pioneer Robert Goddard, they can conduct scientific experiments by varying the trajectory angle and launch energy. They will progress to the creation of bottle rockets and the development of a rocket of their own design. The culminating project will include the construction of a model rocket and launch. **Students may be required to provide a model rocket or may be charged an additional fee to purchase materials used in this portion of the class.** This is a "hands-on" class that offers you an opportunity to design, build, and soar into the clouds!

I-35 MINI ADVENTURES (A Bunch of Neat Stuff) Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:45

In this course, students will be exploring for hidden treasures in the community. Mini courses taught by community volunteers will be the basis for this class. Field trips, speakers, hands-on experiences, and exploration are the things to expect in this class.

I-18 GEOCACHE - HIDDEN TREASURES! Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00

Fascinated with the commercials on TV ("Tom Tom") demonstrating how to find your way from home to your next vacation site? You will participate in both indoor and outdoor activities. These activities will involve a variety of intramural games with emphasis on "FUN." I-39 BULLSEYE ARCHERY Both Sessions: 8:30-10:00 or 10:00-11:45

(Helps participants feel comfortable in the water)

- Blow bubbles through mouth and nose
- Bobbing
- Open eyes under water and retrieve submerged objects
- Front and back glides and floats
- Recover to vertical position
- Roll from front to back and back to front
- Tread water using arm and hand actions
- Alternating and simultaneous leg actions on front and back
- Alternating and simultaneous arm actions on front and back
- Combined arm and leg actions on front and back

LEVEL IV

Stroke Improvement

(Develops confidence in the skills learned and improves other aquatic skills)

- Headfirst entries from the side in compact and stride positions
- Swim under water
- Feetfirst surface dive
- Survival swimming
- Front crawl and backstroke open turns
- Tread water using 2 different kicks
- Front and back crawl, elementary backstroke, breaststroke, sidestroke and butterfly
- Flutter and dolphin kicks on back

LEVEL II

Fundamental Aquatic Skills

(Gives participants success with fundamental skills)

- Enter and exit water by stepping or jumping from the side
- Fully submerge and hold breath
- Bobbing
- Open eyes under water and retrieve submerged objects
- Front, jellyfish and tuck floats
- Front and back glides and floats
- Recover to vertical position
- Roll from front to back and back to front
- Change direction of travel while swimming on front or back
- Tread water using arm and leg actions
- Combined arm and leg actions on front and back
- Finning arm action

LEVEL V

Stroke Refinement

(Provides further coordination and refinement of strokes)

- Shallow-angle dive from the side then glide and begin a front stroke
- Tuck and pike surface dives, submerge completely
- Front flip turn and backstroke flip turn while swimming
- Front and back crawl, elementary backstroke, breaststroke, sidestroke and butterfly
- Sculling

LEVEL III

Stroke Development

(Builds on the skills in Level 2 through additional guided practice in deeper water)

- Enter water by jumping from the side
- Headfirst entries from the side in sitting and kneeling positions
- Bobbing while moving toward safety
- Rotary breathing
- Survival float
- Back float
- Change from vertical to horizontal position on front and back
- Tread water
- Flutter, scissor, dolphin and breaststroke kicks on front
- Front crawl and elementary backstroke

LEVEL VI

Swimming and Skill Proficiency

Refines the strokes so participants swim them with ease, efficiency, power and smoothness over greater distances. Level 6 is designed with "menu" options that focus on preparing participants for more advanced courses, including the Water Safety Instructor, or other aquatic activities, such as competitive swimming or diving
