The Wisconsin Rapids Community

Located in North Central Wisconsin, Wisconsin Rapids surrounds the scenic Wisconsin River. The city of Wisconsin Rapids has a population of approximately 20,000 people. The greater Wisconsin Rapids area is home to approximately 45,000 people.

A unified school district with a school population of over 5,500, Wisconsin Rapids Public Schools has eight 4K-grade 5 elementary schools, a middle school (grades 6-7), a junior high (grades 8-9) and two senior high schools (Lincoln High School and River Cities High School). The school system has earned a solid reputation as a progressive, professional organization, which has high student achievement and a low drop out rate. Staff members continue to be recognized by state organizations and agencies for their professionalism and expertise. Our graduates have demonstrated success at Big-Ten Universities, Ivy League schools, military academies, and other public and private schools.

The major employer in the area, NewPage Corp., is a leading producer of enamel papers for the print media and employs over 2,500 people. Other area employers include McCain, Ocean Spray, and Renaissance Learning. Other industries include cheese and other food processing, chemicals, and cranberry growing and processing. A modern industrial park serves a vast array of companies as a manufacturing and distribution center.
